## **Counting One, Two, and Five-Cent Coins**



This coin is worth 1 cent (euro cent).
We write 1 c.



This coin is worth two cents.
We write 2 c.



This coin is worth five cents = 5 c.

In the exercises we use small pictures of these coins. Can you tell which is which?







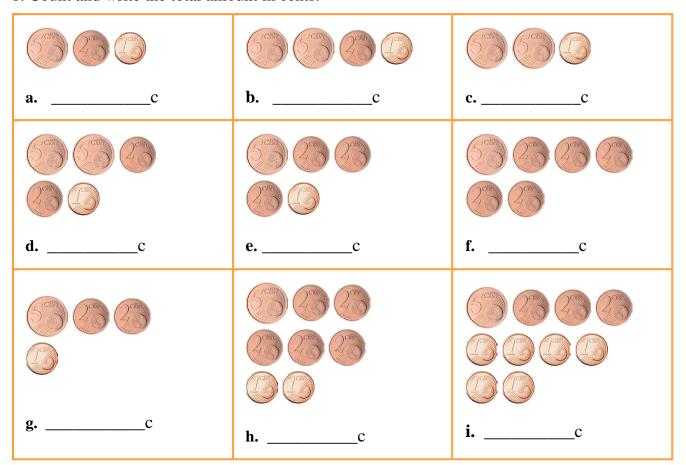
Do not confuse these coins! They are all copper-coloured. The five-cent coin is the largest of these three, and the two-cent coin is larger than the one-cent coin. To be sure, look at the number written on them.

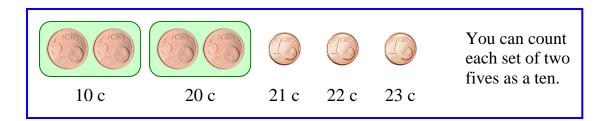


To find the total cent-value, add the cent-values. It's called **counting up**.

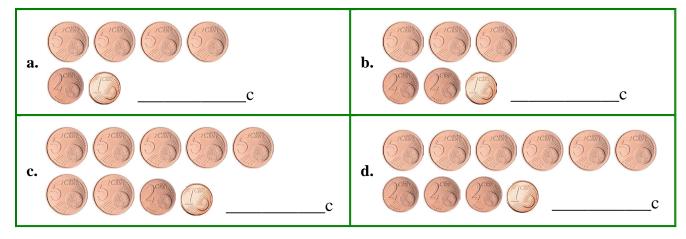
Start counting with the coins of the largest value. The total on the right is 15 cents.

## Many ways to make the same amount!

Each collection below shows 7 cents, but uses different coins.







If the cent-amount ends in 5, 6, 7, 8, or 9, it is good to use the five-cent coin.
